EMERGENCY NUMBERS/ HEALTHCARE

The Swedish emergency number is 112.

If you need medical advice the number is 1177, at below website you can also find information about where to go. The number to call with an abroad phone is $+46\ 771-11\ 77\ 00$

Don't forget to check what's needed if you need healthcare in Sweden. If a EU-citizen for example you should bring the European Health Insurance Card (EU Card).

TRANSPORT

SL -Public transport Stockholm's local traffic: https://sl.se/en/in-english

It's easy to get around in Stockholm by bus or trains. The local public transport company is called SL. If you can, it's recommended to download the app "Res i Sthlm" or "SL-reseplanerare och biljetter" on your phone. "Travis" is an app for buying tickets for SL or you can blip your credit card (VISA, Mastercard or American Express) at the checkpoints. There is also a possibility to buy a card at the kiosk "Pressbyrån" or in the manned card blocking for 20:- SEK and fill it with the preferred amount. Notice that it's important NOT to keep this card together with credit card when you blip at the latch, as there can be withdrawn from credit card as well- double charge.

It's important to have a valid ticket as checks are often done, and the cost is rather palpable.

Konstfack: Nearest subway station for Konstfack is Telefonplan. Adress: LM Ericssons Väg 14, 126 27 Hägersten

SL-tickets are also valid on ferries within the city. It's an amazing way to explore the city. See the routes here:

NOTE: Taxi prices are not regulated in Sweden; they may vary greatly. It is the customer's responsibility to check prices beforehand. Check the price on the yellow-and-white label, which is usually on the rear door window, before entering the vehicle.

A nice page where you can access a lot of information about Stockholm is the above page "visit Stockholm" where you, depending on your interest, can find out where to go and explore Stockholm. Maybe you want to see the "musts" or you have a special interest to explore?

To be short and general the different parts in central Stockholm differ. Östermalm is the posh area where you find in general more exclusive brands and so on, as well as The Royal Library- KB and the nice park Humlegården or Djurgården (highly recommended area for relaxed time). Kungsholmen is more mixed supply. Södermalm is the creative and mischievous neighborhood, Nytorget and Nytorgsgatan should be mentioned if you want to shop or hang around. The Old town area has some very nice streets but also can be a bit of a tourist trap.

ANTIQUES

There are different areas of Antiques. Östermalm is the more expensive area and Sibyllegatan offers an interesting road to visit for ex seeing Alvar Alto or other well known designers work. Södermalm offers a more laid back supply but an interesting area for accessible design. There are also many second-hand shops with different profiles around town.

If you are interested of anthroposophical architecture or just beautiful architecture **Erik Asmussens** work could interest you- in Järna outside Stockholm, or Kristoffer school at Bromma. The thoughts in anthropology was that anthroposophical buildings should replicate the human form, eschewing straight lines, right angles and the traditional limitations of buildings wherever possible, in favor of swooping curves and organic, rounded shapes. It follows from various movements of 19th century spiritism and German idealist philosophy, arising at a time when scientists were repeatedly discovering the invisible, such as atoms, waves, and magnetic forces. The selectable trip to Skyspace will bring you to Järna, please look at program for further information.

A building by **Gunnar Asplund** is the Skandia Theater (often called Skandia-biografen) is Stockholm's most famous classic cinema, located in the Waro-dellska house. The cinema was inaugurated in 1923 and was designed by architect Gunnar Asplund, and is today considered one of the most beautiful in Stockholm.

Asplund also was together with Lewerentz the architects of the beautiful "Skogskyrkogården", the wooden cemetery. The main idea was that nature is soothing in grief, and whoever visits the site un-derstands that the visions were so much bigger than a burial site. It is feeling and reverence chiseled through architecture. https://skogskyrkogarden.stockholm/



Not in alphabetical order but what should be presented next is **Sigurd Lewerentz**s work. He did the proposal together with Asplund at the Wooden cemetery and their disagreement was perhaps the reason for the withdrawal of Lewerentz from the big scene. After over a decade of "absence" from architecture, Sigurd Lewerentz reappeared with the creation of St. Mark's Church in Björkhagen, Stockholm. His winning design for the church brought him back to the art of building, and his apt control of materiality brought the St. Mark's Church international attention.

The Culture House, Kulturhuset, is a cultural center and theater offering seminars, art and design exhibitions and performances. The house was designed by **Peter Celsing** and his office and was finished 1972, recently the house was renovated in a responsible way, which has been noticed.

Celsing also drew a worth seeing church in Vällingby (presented under "Vällingby"), St:Thomas church. In Årsta Celsing also drew a church, very peeled off, it have been payed attention in design fields.

Ralph Erskine put his signature in Stockholm. He was captured by the welfare society's thinking and by the close connection between design, architecture and social responsibility. There is a small museum at Ekerö, Lovön, "The box" (not so easily accessible) that shows how his first own house looked. Also Ekerö center is interesting to see- built between 1983-1991. On the way to Erskines "The box" you will also pass the king's castle at Drottningholm with beautiful "China castle"

Erskines Stockholm Campus building from 1981 is also worth seeing. https://hicarquitectura.com/2019/05/ralph-erskine-frescati-stockholm-university-campus-1977/ **Léonie Geisendorf** production came to be characterized by the ideals of late modernism in the spirit of Le Corbusier, with strong, raw materials and constructions in untreated concrete. Her work is often attributed to features of brutalism and structuralism. "Matchstick Palace" was designed by architect Ivar Tengbom. It was commissioned by the "Match King" Ivar Kreuger (1880–1932) as the headquarters of the Swedish match company. Behind the latticework and Corinthian columns of the main portico is the horseshoe-shaped inner courtyard on which the building is centered. The façades of the ground floor are dressed in marble from Kolmården and the courtyard is furnished with the sculpture Diana fountain I by sculptor Carl Milles. Gert Wingårdh needs to be mentioned. He is seen by many as the only current "star architect" in Sweden. One of his latest buildings is the extension at Liljevalch's museum. There has been a great deal of controversy surrounding the building as the raw architecture stands in stark contrast to Djurgården's otherwise preserved and sensitive environment.

"Arkitekturupproret" or, the architecture revolt, is a Swedish non-profit association, which was founded in September 2016. It works for new construction according to classical architectural tradition, improved area planning and a strengthened protection for existing cultural values. Wingårds work seems to be the associations most questioned, but the discussion is interesting if you look at it at the core. What are architectural qualities and who has the right to say what this is? Environmental psychology was developed during the 60s, for example, based on a criticism of the million dollar programs. But unfortunately, the really interesting discussion has become stuck in simple clichés debate.

The Stockholm town hall was consecrated 1923 and is one of the country's leading examples of national romanticism in architecture. The City Hall was designed by architect **Ragnar Östberg** and is built from eight million bricks. The great Nobel banquet is also held at City Hall, so maybe you have seen the inside from the Nobel Prize awarding ceremony. Below a picture with town hall to the left, seen from Södra Mälarstrand.

INTERESTING ARCHITECTURE AREAS:

Hammarby sjöstad is a cycle-adapted district near the lake in the ring of the stone town with the character of neomodernism and neighborhood town. Build between 1994-2020.

Understenshöjden is an ecovillage located in Björkhagen, Stockholm. The project was planned and carried out during the 1990's and is Stockholms first ecovillage.

Vällingby is an interesting area if you are interested in mid-century political thoughts. Vällingby is considered a very important work in Swedish modernism and urban planning. The town plans for Vällingby's sub-areas followed the General Plan for Stockholm in 1952, which was drawn up under the direction of the director of town planning, architect **Sven Markelius**. The idea was to build a new type of district, which would not become a sleeping town but become a so-called "ABC city" with jobs, housing and center in the same area. Former world famous prime minister Olof Palme was also living on "Vällingby height" -which is famous for its human scale row houses from the mid-century and houses that follows the nature's typography.

Västerortkyrkan by Carl Nyren and Bertil Engstrand is also worth seeing in Vällingby. Le Corbuiser supposedly said 1958:

"If you are going to see beautiful churches in Europe, there are three you should not miss: Basilica of St. Peter in Rome, Notre Dame in Paris and Västerort Church in Vällingby."

But also **Celsing** drew a beautiful church in Vällingby, St Thomas Church. The ensemble of the Church of St. Thomas can be interpreted as an oasis of monastic seclusion in the busy environment placed just beside the shopping center.



ART

Stockholm metro line also have art at every station, a favorite worth seeing is Kungsträdgården by artists **Ulrik Samuelsson** and **Arne Fredriksson**. There are a lot of traces from the old Klara area. The Norrmalm regulation (also City decontamination) is the comprehensive revision of the town plan for lower Norrmalm in Stockholm's inner city, which was realized during the 1950-1970s. The implementation resulted in that hundreds of old houses in the area "Klara" from 18th century were torn down to give way to the modern Stockholm city. Hundreds of houses were demolished in Stockholm City and instead, new subway lines, car tunnels, Hötorgetskraporna and Kulturhuset were built.



BOOK ANTIQUARIANS

"Rönnells" at Birger Jarlsgatan 32 is recommended to visit, or the more specific "Stockholms Science Fiction-antikvariat" at Rutger Fuchsgatan 8. There are also other antiquarians to be explored.
